Making sounds is the first step on the way to forming full words. Match animals to their sounds - try out your best impressions!

'The cow goes...' **'Moo!'**

'The duck goes...' **'Quack!'**

MYSTERY BOX

Fill a box with toys or household items of different shapes, sizes and textures. Take turns to close your eyes (no peeking!) and pick a mystery item. Is it fluffy or spiky? Big or small? Can you guess what it is?



Yarning with bub builds their language and communication skills and helps their brain develop.

Hearing lots of different words over and over boosts the variety of words they can use. It also makes those long car rides more interesting!
